
A Fantastic **Christmas Gift** for your Child

Blueprint 2020

September 2016/17 sees the fourth year of our dynamic six year school development strategy. This innovative and far ranging plan will bring our school to the next level in terms of learning and services to our community.

In this section we want to share some of our key strategic goals for the year ahead and then focus in on a few of the key innovations. Over the next year we will regularly report on what has been achieved and the new projects that we develop.

Strategic Leadership

To share good practice across the school and beyond to enhance staff development and pupils' attainment. This will include the development and coaching of curriculum leaders;

The continued development of Shared Education with St. James's Primary School. In particular, this will allow the schools to promote S.T.E.M. and Forest School learning as well as achieving 'Rights Respecting Schools' status;

To engage with community stakeholders to increase aspirations, attainment, early intervention and collaboration. This will include focused family learning support interventions.

Ethos

Implement and review a whole school wellbeing strategy;

Achieve the British Council's International School Award by June 2018;

Use the pursuit of the Eco Green Flag, by June 2019, as a means to educate our school community to be more eco friendly.

Learning and Teaching

90+% of pupils, in both, Literacy and Numeracy will achieve as expected or above;

I.C.T. will more effectively enrich creativity, thinking skills and improve school management;

Review and update our P.D.M.U. provision.

December Update

The inspection service visited the school in November to evaluate our work in Shared Education. In summary, the inspector described **our sense of vision and the resulting innovation as 'mind blowing!'** Our work is likely to be used as a case study of excellent practice across Northern Ireland.

Our P.D.M.U. & Discipline approach was showcased in Parliament Buildings as an example of excellent practice. Our annual anti-bullying survey was also outstanding in terms of pupils' knowledge and confidence!

The school has been working with a wide range of community partners to submit a threeyear **area based plan to increase the access to social and educational resources** for the wider community. By January we hope to hear that we have successfully gained significant funding that will make a big difference across our whole area.

Talking Points: Children's Reading

Every month we would like to share an educational issue with our families. The need for parents and teachers to be on the 'same page' is so important to help our pupils reach their full potential. My hope is that parents would find this information useful and thought provoking. We are also very keen for parents to respond with their comments to us. This month we want to discuss the importance of encouraging pupils to read for pleasure.

As we approach Christmas many parents are searching for those very special last minute gifts. We all look for that gift that keeps on giving. Providing your child with a book that grips their interest is a great option!

Here is some interesting research about the impact of getting children to read more for pleasure. It really is interesting:

Low levels of literacy cost the UK an estimated **£81 billion a year**!

Incomes are higher in countries with high adult reading ages;

In Northern Ireland the **hourly wage of workers with the highest levels of literacy is 94% higher** than for workers who have the lowest levels of literacy;

Reading for pleasure is a more powerful factor in life than their background;

If your child reads <u>at least 30 minutes a day</u> it is likely to **boost reading by one full year**;

16 year-olds who choose to read books for pleasure outside of school are **more likely to secure managerial or professional jobs in later life** (the habit has to start now!)

This Christmas our children need toys but do not forget books! We have a fantastic library in school and in the local area. Families can access thousands of great books free of charge!

As you have extra time family time over Christmas and you prepare to go into 2017 consider some strategies to help your family read more:

Have regular bedtime stories (including older pupils too!)

Consider having **family reading times** (read a book together or everyone reads their own book at the same time);

Mums and dads should be reading role models;

Have a weekly library visit;

Start a Family Book Club when everyone talks about the stories they are reading.

Is all of this easy? No, at the start it is hard work and will involve sacrifice. Just like going the gym you have to work really hard to develop better habits. Once you do, however, the results feel and look great. The link between successful readers and adults who reach their life goals is undeniable. This Christmas put improving your family's enjoyment of reading at the top of your list to Santa!





On Monday 28th November 2016 five of our Year 5 pupils had the opportunity to travel to Parliament Buildings to attend a celebration of All Stars. This is a training programme our pupils and staff have engaged in to develop pupils' character development and their resulting behaviour.

This was an amazing privilege as our school was the only primary school in the country to be selected for this event.

Our pupils represented us so impressively! They made a very confident and entertaining 15 minute presentation that captured the essence of the 'All Stars' programme. It included a Power-Point, artwork and a piece drama they had written.

Mrs Robinson and Miss Carson accompanied them and were incredibly proud of how they spoke so clearly in front of a room full of adults, including special MLAs and the Education Minister.

The children were greatly encouraged by all the amazing feedback and congratulations they received. We would like to thank Barnardo's for giving us this wonderful programme of study and a great day out.

Shared Education ETI visit

ETI came to visit our school at the beginning of the month to look at our Shared Education partnership with St James PS.

The inspector highlighted many positives from the project such as:

- The partnership was praised for its innovative and long-term vision for Shared Education;
- The leadership was described as both well paced and not being risk adverse;
- The support of parents and governors was seen as a significant strength;
- The partnership had been praised for 'grasping the nettle' of school improvement by targeting STEM and specifically mathematics as an area of improvement.

ETI were very impressed and extremely positive about the project. The staff in the partnership, have been highly commended for their enthusiasm and passion.

Love for Life

On Wednesday 16th November we welcomed Year 6 and 7 parents to a **'Love for Life'** workshop. This fantastic charity works beside schools as part of their **Relationship and Sexuality Education** curriculum to educate and empower both children and their parents.

The parents met with the team of workers from 'Love for Life' to learn about the work that will be done with their children in January 2017 as part of the 'New Year, New You' week.

The point of this evening was to prepare parents to anticipate and respond to children's questions after the pupils' workshop in school. The greater goal is to facilitate an on-going 'conversation' between children and parents not only in primary school but into post-primary school and beyond.

The parents had a great night and their evaluations were very pleasing.
