360 Degree e-Safety Award



On Thursday 30th March we welcomed three expert judges to our school for the day. They were each very skilled in both ICT safety and teaching. Their remit was to assess our e-safety processes and how we store our data.

They met pupils, parents and staff to test the robustness of our policies and practice.

After a very intense day and what seemed like a long wait, we were told we had achieved the award. We are only the second primary school in Northern Ireland to have achieved this. Everyone was delighted!

Nut Free Zone



In school we have several children who will have a severe and life threatening reaction if exposed to nuts. We therefore are a nut free school and ask all parents to carefully check that breaks and lunches do not contain any nuts. Thank you for your support.

"Learning to Live"

Are you losing out on a free school uniform and school dinners?

Last year we lost around £20,000 of funding because families did not claim the benefits they were entitled to. This year it could be even more!

A pupil is entitled to free school meals and a uniform grant if:

- the parent/guardian is in receipt of Income Support, Income-Based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income-Related Employment and Support Allowance, or if a pupil claims Income Support in their own name; or,
- the parent/guardian is in receipt of Child Tax Credit or Working Tax Credit and has an annual taxable income of £16,190 or less; or.
- he/she has a statement of special educational needs and is designated to require a special diet; or
- the parent is in receipt of the Guarantee element of State Pension Credit; or
- he/she is the child of an asylum seeker supported by the Home Office National Asylum Support Service (NASS).

Some people do not apply. Even if you do not want meals you are losing out on £35.75 per child for uniforms.

In addition, the school also loses out on funding. We did a study of one year group and found that eight parents were not claiming free meals. Based on this survey, assuming this is typical of each year group, we are losing around £20,000 per year, which could be used very well in our school.

Education cuts are looking to be very serious over the next three years. We need to get every penny of budget available to us. To miss out on over £20,000 of funding will have serious consequences for our school. Please apply!

September 2016/17 sees the fourth year of our dynamic six year school development strategy. This innovative and far ranging plan will bring our school to the next level in terms of learning and services to our community.

In this section we want to share some of our key strategic goals for the year ahead and then focus in on a few of the key innovations. Over the next year we will regularly report on what has been achieved and the new projects that we develop.

Strategic Leadership

To share good practice across the school and beyond to enhance staff development and pupils' attainment. This will include the development and coaching of curriculum leaders;

The continued development of Shared Education with St. James's Primary School. In particular, this will allow the schools to promote S.T.E.M. and Forest School learning as well as achieving 'Rights Respecting Schools' status;

To engage with community stakeholders to increase aspirations, attainment, early intervention and collaboration. This will include focused family learning support interventions.

Ethos

Implement and review a whole school wellbeing strategy;

Achieve the British Council's International School Award by June 2018;

Use the pursuit of the Eco Green Flag, by June 2019, as a means to educate our school community to be more eco friendly.

Learning and Teaching

90+% of pupils, in both, Literacy and Numeracy will achieve as expected or above;

I.C.T. will more effectively enrich creativity, thinking skills and improve school management;

Review and update our P.D.M.U. provision.

April Update:

On the 30th March we were awarded our **360 Degree e-Safety Award**. This international charter mark is only achieved by schools who have demonstrated the highest levels of practice. We are <u>only the second primary school in Northern Ireland</u> to be awarded this charter mark.

Governors visited the nursery at the end of last term to **observe the use of the campus**. It was great to see that all the work that has been invested over the past two years is now paying off.

On the 29th - 31st March we held our second **shared education residential.** Eleven families from each school headed to Ballycastle for a few days of fun and learning. It was a super experience!

On the last week of term some of the staff from St. James's Primary School and Whitehouse Primary School came together to develop our planning for learning; especially play, This is part of the **Shared Education project**. This work is called **T.P.L.** (Teachers' Professional Learning).

Whitehouse Primary School Holiday 2017/2018

School begins on **Wednesday 30th August 2017**. On both Wednesday and Thursday of this week school will end at 12pm for Year 1 to 4 classes and 12.15pm for Year 5 to 7 classes. This will allow for the annual pastoral care training of our non-teaching staff.

Friday 1st September will be our first full day of the year.

Pupils will be off on Thursday 28th and Friday 29th September for **staff training days**. School will be closed Monday 30th October until Friday 3rd November 2017 for the **Autumn Holiday**.

School will be closed Thursday 21st December 2017 to Friday 5th January 2018 for the **Christmas Holidays** (this includes two staff training day). School will end on Wednesday 20th December at 12pm for Year 1 to 4 classes and 12.15pm for Year 5 to 7 classes. School opens again on Monday 8th January 2018.

The school will be closed on Thursday 15th and Friday 16th February 2018 for the **Winter Holiday**. School opens again on Monday 19th February 2018.

The school will be closed on Monday 26th March to April 6th 2018 for the **Easter Holidays**. School will end on Friday 23rd March at 12pm for Year 1 to 4 classes and 12.15pm for Year 5 to 7 classes. School opens again on Monday 9th April 2018.

The school will close for two **May Day Holidays**. These will be on Monday 7th and 28th May 2018.

The school year finishes on Friday 29th June 2018 for the **Summer Holidays**. School will end at 12pm for Year 1 to 4 classes and 12.15pm for Year 5 to 7 classes.

We have published these holiday dates well in advance to help parents avoid booking family holidays during term time. Please avoid taking children out of school for family holidays. Pupils' attainment is impacted when they are not in school!

Talking Points: Play & Education

Every month we would like to share an educational issue with our families. The need for parents and teachers to be on the 'same page' is so important to help our pupils reach their full potential. My hope is that parents would find this information useful and thought provoking. We are also very keen for parents to respond with their comments to us. This month we want to discuss the link between **play & a successful education.** From Nursery to Year 7 we believe all pupils should engage in 'playful learning'. This can include a wide range of activities from building in a sand tray to designing robots during S.T.E.M. workshops. It can be indoors, outdoors or even in cyberspace. As educators we see the value of play to stimulate and reinforce high quality learning and teaching.

Is it just play?

As George Bernard Shaw said:

'We don't stop playing because we grow old, we grow old because we stop playing.'

'A quick look at the ways in which play contributes to developing creativity and problem-solving skills, building knowledge and self-confidence and encouraging innovation and risk-taking, should convince even the most hard-headed cynics that it continues to be integral to intellectual, physical, emotional and social growth throughout childhood.' (S. Brown)

Dr. Stuart Brown is a world-renowned psychiatrist who makes a strong case for the importance of play to brain development, social integration and life success - from birth through to old age.

During the early years, as children's brains grow dramatically and they move rapidly from one developmental stage to the next, play remains central to their growth and development and is the primary means by which they build cognitive skills and begin to make sense of the world.

A recent study undertaken by the Universities of Strathclyde, Stirling and West of Scotland explored this issue when the Scotlish Executive was planning to introduce a play-based pedagogy described as 'Active Learning'. This involved incorporating periods of more traditional teacher-led whole-class learning in areas such as phonics and number work with periods of play-based activities in smaller groups. All of the teachers involved in this study believed that this type of active or play-based learning promoted a positive, enthusiastic attitude to learning and encouraged independence and confidence in the children.

A Wellcome Trust report from 2005 recommended that, in order to spark children's enthusiasm and interest in science, there should be wider use of creative and innovative approaches such as role-play, stories and cross-curricular teaching, which would help children link up what they are learning and better understand the relevance of science in their everyday lives.

By following the lead of the child, listening, observing, and questioning when appropriate, we are able to extend the play experience in a positive and non-controlling way and enhance learning.

By providing ample opportunities for play, creating environments that support play both inside and outside the classroom, and playing with our children, we are sending the message that play is an important aspect to our lives. The seeds of creativity and innovation that arise out of early play experiences will continue to grow and thrive if we continue to encourage play, not just when our children are young, but as they move through childhood.

Attendance & Punctuality



It is our aim to keep school attendance levels at 97% or above. With assessments continuing right up to the end of term we ask that you ensure your child attends school every day.

An attendance of 95% is seen as only 'satisfactory' on reports. It is important that we aim for high attendance and punctuality as they have strong links with high achievement.

If your child has attendance below 90% from aged 4 to 16 they will have missed more than a year of their education!

Punctuality is crucial. Many children who arrive late are missing valuable learning and teaching time. Make sure your child is in class for 9am so that they so not miss out.
